Recently I visited the country farm of a friend in Kerala. It was in a rural area near the Trivandrum backwaters, some 20 kilometres away from anything you'd consider urban. My friend asked if I wanted fresh coconut water. I said yes, and he pulled out his cell phone and dialled a number. A voice replied" I'm here." We looked up and there was the local toddy tapper, on top of the nearest coconut tree, with his lungi tied up at his knees, a hatchet in one hand and a cell phone in the other. He brought the coconuts down, we had a refreshing drink, and I marvelled once again as what the cell phone revolution has wrought in our country.

As some readers know, my recent book is called 'The Elephant, the Tiger and the Cell phone." It is a book about the transformation of India, and two-thirds of the title is perhaps self-explanatory. I begin the book with a Panchantantra type fable about India as a lumbering, slumbering, ponderous elephant, mired in its own dust and mud, covered in flies, slow to move, slow to change, which in recent years has appeared to be acquiring the stripes of an agile, lithe and sinewy tiger. But the third element of the title comes in because to me the cell phone is the instrument that most epitomizes this change.

I grew up in an India in which telephones were both rare and virtually useless. When I left India in 1975 to go to the US for graduate studies, we had perhaps 600 million residents in the country and just two million land-line telephones. Having a telephone was a rare privilege, if you weren't an important government official, or a doctor, or a journalist, you might languish in a long waiting list and never receive a phone. Telephones were such a rarity (after all, 90% of the population had no access to a telephone line) that elected members of Parliament had amongst their privileges the right to allocate 15 telephone connections to whomever they deemed worthy.

The small village of Somnathpur contains an extraordinary temple, built around 1286 A.D. by the Hoyasalas of Karnataka — one of the most prolific temple builders. Belur and Helebid are among the better-known works. While these suffered during the invasion of the 14<sup>th</sup> century, the Somnathpur temple stands more or less intact in near-original condition. The small temple captivates with the beauty and vitality of its detailed sculpture, covering almost every inch of the walls, pillars and even ceilings. It has three Shikars and stands on a star-shaped raised platform with 24 edges. The outer walls have a profusion of detailed carvings" the entire surface run over by carved plaques of stone. There were vertical panels covered by exquisite figures of Gods and Goddesses, with many incarnations being depicted. There were nymphs too, some carrying an ear of maize, a symbol of plenty and prosperity. The elaborate ornamentation, very characteristic of Hoyasala sculptures was a remarkable feature. One closer look——and it is worth it—— the series of friezes on the outer walls revealed intricately carved caparisoned elephants, charging horsemen, stylized flowers and warriors.

Co-education is a system of education where boys and girls study together. In a country as conservative as India, co-education helps boys and girls break popular misconceptions existing between both since time immemorial.

Co-education encourages familiarity between boys and girls and they start breaking misconceptions about each other. Their general outlook changes and they develop a healthy normal relationship with more mature personalities. There is no discrimination based on sex. It has often been seen that students who come from a co-educational background are better communicators than students who study in the same sex institutions. Co-education also helps students in their later life when they become professionals and interact with the opposite sex. As these boys and girls lose their shyness, they develop a broader outlook and are devoid of a narrow mentality. It is necessary to have more co-educational institutions, to nurture good, normal, healthy citizens who in turn can help remove social evils like dowry through joint efforts. Co-education can also reduce eve teasing, rape, ragging and other crimes against women. With more understanding a mutual respect is developed and the mind is free of any unsavoury thoughts. Thinking maturity comes at an early age and goes a long way in developing well-rounded personalities in both.

(II) Extract: Yes, there was a skeleton in the cupboard, and although I never saw it, it played a small part in the events that followed its discovery. I was fifteen that year, and I was back in my boarding school in Simla after spending the long winter holidays in Dehradun. My mother was still managing the old Green's hotel in Dehra – a hotel that was soon to disappear and became part of Dehra's unrecorded history. It was called Green's not because it purported the spread of any greenery(its neglected garden was choked with lantana) but because it had been started by an Englishman, Mr. Greenback in 1920, just after the great war had ended in Europe. Mr. Green had died out the outset of the Second World War. He had just sold the hotel and was on his way back to England when the ship on which he was travelling was torpedoed by a German submarine. Mr. Green went down with the ship.

The hotel had already been in decline, and the new owner a Sikh businessman from Ludhiana, had done his best to keep it going. But post-war and post-Independence, Dehra was going through a lean period. My stepfather's motor workshop was also going through a lean period a crisis, in fact — and my mother was glad to take the job of running the small hotel while he took a job in Delhi. She wrote to me about once a month, giving me news of the hotel, some of its most interesting guests, the pictures that were showing in town.

"I know you're interested in detective stories." She wrote during the summer term," and that you fancy yourself a Sherlock Holmes or Elley Queen. So what do you make of this strange happening? Last week we decided to clear out an old store-room that hadn't been opened for years. The keys were missing, so we had to break open the lock—inside there was a lot of furniture, rotting carpets, dusty files, broken flowerpots, even a mounted tiger's head. There were tow or three locked cupboards which had to be forced open. Nothing much in the first two, but the third cupboard gave everyone a fright. As Triloki, our billiard marker, pulled open the door, a skeleton tumbled out! I mean a complete human skeleton.


